Social stories should be used at a pace that suits the child using them, and as a fun way to support them through these tricky topics.


The picture boxes are used to provide a visual explanation, and they use colours and consistent imagery to help with emotional understanding.

The vet might already be looking after another sick or hurt pet.






Dogs sometimes bark loudly, and cats meow and hiss.




This is because they are worried, or happy, about visiting the vet.



he vet may put your dog or a table so they can look at them closely.




The vet will look at your dog and check parts of your dog's body.



The vet does this so they can tell how to help your dog.


What is the vet going to do?

The vet will ask your grownup questions, and they may talk a lot about your dog.











The grown-ups will be happy that they can talk without me being bored.

What happens when it's time to go home?






My grown-up may need to speak to the receptionist before we leave.




I will wait with my grown-up until they are finished.
